






Grade 1

What makes a great detective?

This is one of the many interesting things that the G4 students are discovering in the exciting module of Mysteries and Monsters.

In chapter one of Sir Arthur Conan Doyle's mystery, 'The Sign of the Four', Sherlock Holmes tells us what he takes to be a great detective like himself:



"He possesses two out of the three qualities necessary for the ideal detective. He has the **power of observation** and that of **deduction**. He is only wanting in **knowledge**; and that may come in time."

Basically, you need to be able to spot the clues, use your knowledge and intelligence to put the clues together and draw the correct conclusions.

Do you have the qualities to be a great detective? Have a look at the two mysteries and see! ^(C)

Mystery 2:

The wife says she was sleeping, the cook says he was preparing breakfast, the maid says she was collecting the mail and the butler says he was polishing the silver for afternoon tea.

After listening to the stories, it takes only minutes for the police to spot the lie and know who the murderer is.






Other highlights of this module so far include poster designs and learning the classic Michael Jackson anthem on selfreflection and responsibility, "Man in the Mirror" (1988).


