








After the reading lessons, students worked on different writing tasks like making their own *Funnybones* books and drawing their favourite characters. Let's have a look at their amazing work!











## Grade 3



Have you ever seen a houseboat in Hong Kong before? A houseboat is a boat that has been designed or modified to be used as a home. People cook and eat, play and sleep, and even work on their boats. The houseboat is a kind of waterside home. Our Grade 3 students have been learning about homes in Module Three. Their recent focus was "waterside homes".

Module 3 has finally come to an end in Grade 4. The students are very happy that all the tests and quizzes are out of the way, and had a chance to work on something fun – the Module 3 Storytelling Final Project!

For the past few months, we've been talking a lot about what makes a good story: strong characters that we care about, a problem that the main character has to solve, and a solution that shows the character solved the problem while learning something. We also looked at how to make our story more interesting to read by using descriptive writing. "The boy drank some water" tells us what's going on, but "The boy wiped the sweat from his forehead with one hand and picked up the ice-cold glass of water with the other. The ice in the glass tinkled like tiny bells as he lifted the glass to his lips. "Aaah, finally!" he wheezed as he gulped the water down his thirsty throat" shows us exactly how! Can you find the simile (a comparison using like or as) in the description above?

Each student had to plan, write and illustrate their own story, then present it to the



class. This is a major project that students have been working on for over a week and all the teachers are really impressed with the amount of work most students have put into their final project. Great job, everyone!



We're going to have some fun before the final exam at the end of the year, though. Have you heard of Mary Shelley? Probably not, but I bet you've heard of the book she wrote: **Frankenstein.** It's been turned into many movies and the word now means "a monster made from a human returned to life by science" even though it's just the name of the scientist character in the book!

Mary had a tragic life; her mother died a week after she was born, all but one of her children died of illness, and her husband drowned when his boat sank in a storm.

To wrap up our "Mysteries and Monsters" module, we're going to read an adaptation of this famous

book. The children are definitely very excited to read this classic story of fear, misunderstanding and the unknown!








## Engish Performing Arts

As we get closer and closer to our performance deadline, students are starting to feel the crunch! All lines have (mostly) been memorized so it's time to move onto the finer details of the performance.

One thing that we have been doing is adding sound effects. These enhance the story in many ways. One way is to simulate reality; if we have a campfire scene, the crackling sounds of burning wood with occasional POPS! helps the audience believe that there is a real fire on stage ... which we obviously cannot do as it violates the fire code. Another reason to use sound effects is to create an illusion. We can add the sound of a splash and the roar of a waterfall to make the audience believe that the actors are standing beside a huge lake in the middle of the jungle, when they're actually just in the school hall! We can also use sound effects to set the mood: if a man knocks on a door in a scene and a small dog starts yapping, it's an entirely different mood than if a big dog started growling and barking at him!

Students have also started working on the songs, moves and dances we have in the script. Since memorizing the lines is out of the way, we are now working on really bringing the performance to life by putting energy into our voices and our characters. Energetic actors means an engaged audience, and an engaged audience gives energy to the actors!

We look forward to seeing many of our friends and family attending our performance this year.
