Let's have a look at their work!


# Machine Countines

Plus, they have been honing their research skills by finding answers to questions like: Which is the biggest continent? Which is the deepest


ocean? Which is the biggest country? And so on...




#### **Grade Five**

Students also paid a visit to the library to get more information about spies.







Our Grade 6 students started off this module with learning about Human Rights. In groups, they researched and created a poster on one Human Right. They also presented their work to their classmates.












We will be reading a few famous people's stories later in the module and learning about how they changed the world to make it a fairer and better place.

### English Performing Arts (EPA)

English Performing Arts (EPA) is a wonderful way to learn English as it offers fun and stimulating language learning experiences.

EPA provides your child with an invaluable way of gaining specific skills and disciplines in voice, singing, dance/movement and drama. It focuses on students' talent, in addition to teaching them new techniques to enhance their performance. Students also learn new skills such as

debate. and mime Debates can be an method effective enabling students to take an active part in their learning through own preparation the presentation of their own work and that of their peers.



Grade 1 and 2 EPA is integrated with English Language modules.

In Grade 3 EPA lessons, some basic performing skills are introduced to the students. In Grades 4, 5 & 6 they will have an in-depth study of different skills such as drama, music, voice and dance/movement. Students can learn these four components in one year.

Let's have a look at their different lessons.

#### Drama

Drama builds confidence. Even the shyest of children take just a few weeks to gently build up their self-esteem. The students



enjoy the activities so much, that there were times when they forgot they were learning through play. Drama activities greatly improve their language fluency and confidence.

In Drama, our students experience a range of drama activities through the context of life, traditional and fairytale stories.

#### Music/Singing

Music is an easy and fun method through which one can learn and improve language skills. Through the music videos and lyrics of some famous songs, students can improve their English language skills.



Some of the songs learnt in EPA include 'The Lion King', 'The Little Mermaid' and 'Mulan'. Through these songs, students learn good enunciation, use appropriate emotions, phrasing and practise basic staging techniques.

#### Voice

In voice, students learn how to use their voice to convey artistic expression. Not only loud and clear voices are needed. Students are also taught to use their natural voices through the singing of simple songs and recitation of poems.



#### **Dance/Movement**

Dance is a natural method for learning and a basic form of cultural expression. Children learn movement patterns as readily as they learn language. In Grade 3 and 4, students are taught to be consistent in the quality and use of their skills to improvise and extend movement ideas on their own and with others. We use different kinds of music to stimulate their minds. They also learn to create movement spontaneously when presented with movement ideas or problems.

#### A trip to Yulin to help deaf children by 5C Marcus Tsang

This summer, I flew a long way to Yulin in Nanning, Guangxi of China with a medical volunteer group. The group, including my father who is a doctor, aims to help people with ear problems.

First, we went to Yulin's Special School for the Deaf. When we arrived at the Special School, we were warmly welcomed by the teachers and students. The moment I set foot in the classroom, the clapping of the hands roared upon the classroom, making my ears ring. Then my dad delivered a speech about our aims and what we could do to help. After we settled down, I took out a pump and started pumping and twisting balloons into crowns, swords and different animals to comfort the children. While at the other end of the room, my dad used an echoscope to examine the students' ears and gave advice to the parents and teachers. The students could get one of my balloons after checking. They were excited about the balloons which they blast off like fireworks after a while. I was happy to have my little sister to help me give out the balloons and biscuits. The children ate happily so that the cracking sound of the biscuits filled the room. We stayed there for almost two hours. When we finally got ready to leave, I was surprised that they had made souvenirs for us. Our souvenirs were animal toys hand-made with shimmering beads by the children. Happily, the teachers took a picture with our group and we hurried off to our next stop, the Yulin Red Cross Hospital.

When we arrived at the hospital, my dad sped off to the operating room. Whilst my dad was doing operations, my sister and I tried on the surgical gowns and played with our tiger souvenirs. At the end of the day, the group did surgeries for more than ten patients.

At last, our volunteer group finished the job and we started our trip back to Hong Kong. I felt great about this trip because my dad helped the children improve their hearing and I brought some happiness to the students in the special school. It was a very meaningful journey.

# "I OVERCAND

## MOUNTAIN SICKNESS!"

The plane carrying my 18-member group, including my wife and friends, landed in Linzhi County. Coming in from Chengdu, Sichuan, our new altitude was 2900 metres up! We tried to adapt to the low oxygen plateau before we took another plane, flying to the capital of Tibet: Lhasa, with an altitude of 3600 meters.

Located on the Qingzang Plateau, Lhasa is regarded as an extreme living environment for human beings. High altitude, low air pressure and low oxygen level all easily caused mountain sickness, with symptoms of tiredness, weakness, headache, sleeplessness and accelerated heartbeat, which can develop into pulmonary edema and cerebral edema, or even result in death.

In order to overcome possible mountain sickness, we stayed alert and slowed down our pace. We also lightened our load, such as by using lightweight cameras. On our first night on the plateau, we wiped ourselves clean instead of showering and we even avoided washing our hair. Throughout the whole journey, our team arranged for a doctor to check our blood pressure and measure our blood oxygen level every day. We were advised to take medicine if necessary.



After going through much shaking and trembling, most of us successfully overcame mountain sickness, including me. Unfortunately, two members suffered acute mountain sickness and had to receive treatment in a local hospital. I'm lucky I got through it!
