When?



Students have made a lot of beautiful posters about their own festivals.






Grade Three

We are all looking forward to preparing our project, for which we get to collect leaves with different types of edges and shapes. Boys and girls, stay tuned and don't miss the fun!




Grade Four



Denmark:




