In April, 26 senior students were selected to join an overseas study tour. They flew to Australia with 3 teachers. I would like to express a big thank you to Teachers Virginia, Davhina and Chris for their important roles as facilitators and escorts, thus ensuring the tour was a success. For the past few years, the school has provided students with opportunities to visit Singapore and Malaysia to broaden their horizon in English language learning. This year, we chose Australia as it is an English-speaking country and relatively close to Hong Kong.

There will be a sharing session on the 11th of May during the monthly assembly in the hall. All the Australia study tour participants were invited to tell you their experiences. They are going to discuss how they felt about staying with their host families, using English in an English-speaking country and visiting the attractions with their schoolmates that many of whom they travelled with for the first time. I am sure both the presenters and the audience will gain a lot.

Although it was a short journey, it could have already made a difference in some of the participants' lives. It is hard to tell at this moment how much or how they have been influenced by this experience, or by the people they have met and talked to over the duration of the trip. But one thing for sure is that a seed has been planted in their hearts and it can grow fast and strong at any time. It might become one of the factors influencing their decisions making in the future.

You might question the effectiveness of such a short language tour. According to the view of many linguists, language acquisition is biologically linked to age, especially in second language acquisition. Hence, it is highly recommended to send children to learn a language in a linguistically rich environment the earlier the better. However, many parents feel reluctant to send their children to study abroad before they turn 18. Unfortunately, it is also believed that it is hard for older learners to reach a native-like level, in terms of accent acquisition. Therefore, short-term language study tours are becoming popular and popular each day.

The parents are highly positive about their children's experiences. They said it helped increase their cultural sensitivity, improve their confidence, heighten their appreciation for other cultures and increase their interest in studying in a different country. We have gained lots of confidence in running more overseas study tours and hope to explore more English-speaking countries in the near future. Great job! ☺






What is about the animals? What homes do animals live in? Let's look at some of the amazing animal homes!




Weaver birds make nests from sticks and grass. One nest can hold about 400 birds! It's a lot, isn't it?

The 5th graders' second module is about Inventions, and now they are doing the Middle Ages in the third module. But do they know what were invented during the Middle Ages?



People in the Middle Ages did a lot in advancing human knowledge. There were six great inventions at that time, namely the heavy plough, liquor, the hour-glass, water mills, eye-glasses

So far what the 5th graders have learnt is little. They know that the Middle Ages in

Europe occurred between 500 and 1500 A.D. They can also tell life was very harsh in the Middle Ages, and very few people could read or write. In fact, religion dominated everything people did in their daily life. People in the Middle Ages thought there was little hope for improving their living condition. The only hope that most of them had was their belief that God would make their lives better or

- 5. Analyze Your Data and Draw a Conclusion.
- 6. Communicate Your Results.

My neighbourhood is clean and quiet. There are convenience store, bakery, park, swimming pool and bus stop.


I like my neighbourhood because it is convenient.






A Fishing Trip by Sally Fung (1W)
