Many of our students like Mid-autumn Festival and Halloween. They brainstormed ideas and wrote Information Reports on Mid-autumn Festival and Halloween.














Our Grade Three students are exploring some very interesting information about different countries of the world, such as their languages, capital cities, most famous festivals and sports. Through shared reading, children have learned that people wear different kinds of shoes in different countries. For example, in Holland, people used to wear Klompen as work shoes on

By working collaboratively or individually on different tasks, children have learned different culture and nations around the world. Let's have a look at their creative posters.







Our FOURTH graders are currently having their Module 1, **"Rainforest"**.

In the past few weeks, students read books called "The Amazing Amazon & Up the Amazon".

Over the course of this module, we have looked at how rainforest keeps our earth healthy. Rainforest is a vital lifeline of earth, because without the trees in the rainforest, the level of carbon dioxide will rise quickly and oxygen level will fall rapidly.

Our G4 students went online to do researches about rainforests in the school. They learned lots about the characteristics of and animals and plants found in rainforests. Through this learning process, students understand the importance of rainforests to human beings and ways of how to stop human destruction.

Rainforests are disappearing very quickly. It arouses people's awareness of the need to save the rainforests now or never. But it is not going to be easy at all. It will take the efforts of many people working together in order to ensure that rainforests and their wildlife will survive. As a review of Module 1 ~ "Rainforest", our fourth graders will be visiting **Kadoorie Farm and Botanic Garden** in early

November.

At the end of Module 1, students will be asked to play the role of a news reporter or a rainforest animal and write a script using descriptive language. Also, in groups of 4 to 5, students will perform a short skit at school showing the importance of the rainforests to humans.

It is a great opportunity for our grade four students to apply the knowledge that they have learnt in the module in a meaningful and interesting way.

The Fifth Graders have embarked on a secretive journey of gadgets,


technology and double agents... Module 1: Secrets and Spies


